NEW PARTNER IN NEPAL

We are excited about a new partner in the ministry. During our Fall SE Asia mission trip, we met face-to-face and continued to build a relationship with James Poudel in Nepal. James is the Vice Chairman of the Dhankuta Christian District and an Elder in the Aashish Presbyterian Church of Kathmandu. Our CWM-US staff visited with the Poudel family, attended community Bible studies, led a women's conference and discussed possibilities of a partnership. In January, our council voted to support two ministry positions in Nepal under the leadership of James.



One position, held by Lydia Poudel, includes teaching, preaching, leading women's ministry in a Presbyterian church in Pakhribas, leading house fellowships and coordinating special events such as regional women's conferences.

The second position is held by Sunitha Shrestha. She will lead the nondenominational-church fellowship in Deurali village, serve as secretary of the Women in Dhankuta District and conduct evangelistic outreach in villages.



We were able to experience first hand the fruitfulness of this ministry and the faith of James, Lydia, Sunitha and many others. Through this partnership, we look forward to establishing fruit that remains in Nepal and will continue to praise God for His faithfulness.

Our plans are to visit Nepal again in the Fall of 2014. We will lead another women's conference, a leadership conference, teach Bible fellowships and see what God has done during the first year of our partnership. What would prompt a soft-spoken retiree to spend all his free time doing construction for a non-profit organization, instructing young adult volunteers as they joined in, taking care of his elderly neighbors, and making delicious Amish popcorn for underprivileged children? Bob Coblentz just loves to serve – and besides, it keeps him busy!

Bob and his wife, Barbara, moved to Starkville in 2006 to be near their son, Robbie Coblentz, (VP for Stateside Ministries) and his family. Born into an Amish community in Indiana in the 1940's, Bob exhibits the amazing thrift and sturdy workmanship that this heritage instilled in him. His family left the community when it was discovered that they had a motorized washing machine in their basement. Imagine, "Here comes Brother Herman! Turn off the washer!" But one day, they just didn't get downstairs fast enough.

These days, Mr. Bob, as he is affectionately known to all of us, is often heard using a wide variety of power tools as he undertakes the initial stages of development of the Christian World Missions Outreach Center. There is plenty of new lumber being used, but Bob reminds us that recycling was the way of the world long before Green Building ever came into vogue. Thus far, if a 2X4 was removed from one area, it is repurposed in another, and an entire heating and air-conditioning system, along with the duct work, was transferred from another business to our ministry. And the 40 or so green restaurant lamps that he salvaged from a restaurant will also be used in our classrooms – along with their toilets and vanities!

On other days, when the work is not quite as loud, Mr. Bob can be found by following his tuneless whistle through the big warehouse. When he discovered that we have regular movie nights for our neighbors, he offered to make popcorn that he has shipped from an Amish general store in Indiana. His is a rare breed – happy to work hard, taking pride in his workmanship, and always looking for another way to make a difference.

WITNESSES TO GOVERNORS AND KINGS


On my account you will be brought before governors and kings as witnesses to them and to the Gentiles. Matthew 10:18

Often during our mission, we meet with village chiefs and church leaders. But this year, particularly in Nigeria, we saw the Lord fulfilling to us what He promised to the disciples as He sent them out. In Ghana, we worked closely with the Bishop of the area and other leaders. In Nigeria, we not only met with the Prelate (head of Methodist Church Nigeria), the National Lay Leader, bishops, and other church leaders, but we met with chiefs, kings, and the Governor and Deputy Governor of the State of Osun. Having the support of such men and women is important to our mission. It not only provides a level of security and allows us access to the people, but also may lead to the donation of land, much needed supplies or services. Most importantly, however, it allows us to share the Gospel through words or actions with men and women of influence, many of whom are not Christian. LOOKING AHEAD IN AFRICA

Go wide or go deep? Why not both?

We have planted almost 400 churches in Africa and will continue to go wide and reach the world for Christ. However, we also feel that God is leading us to go deeper.

During our 2014 mission to Africa, we discussed with our CWM-Africa staff and Methodist Church leaders the need to strengthen the churches we have started. So in 2015, we will be conducting training seminars with churches that we have already planted. We will also firm-up the strategy for reaching least-reached groups, primarily in the Muslim northern parts of Ghana & Nigeria, and in many isolated, rural villages.

AFRICA 2014 MISSION

MINISTERING THROUGH AGRICULTURE

In 2013 we began an agriculture program in Nigeria. This year we expanded that program to Ghana as well. Dr. Mike Oye, CWM Africa staff, has a PhD in Agricultural Extension and Rural Sociology and in Traditional Naturopathy. Dr. Oye taught 2 two-day seminars in the areas where we were planting churches. The seminars helped large scale and small family farmers to increase production by using insecticides, pesticides and fertilizers that are easily accessible in the local environment. MSU graduate student, Alyssa Barrett and Assistant Professor Laura Lemons, PhD also conducted research regarding our agricultural program in Ghana.



MINISTERING THROUGH MEDICAL CLINICS

When asked if there is medical care available for the people in the village, one pastor replied that it is available, but the person must travel to the city and then pay a lot of money. "So," he said, "it is available but not really feasible for the common person." CWM provides 2 or 3 day medical clinics in the villages where the churches are established. We provide the funds for the doctors and nurses as well as the medicine and supplies. The doctors and usually nurses are indigenous and therefore can communicate easily and effectively for the correct diagnosis. For many, this is the only medical care they have received in a long time.



EVANGELISM THROUGH WORSHIP SERVICES

Prior to our mission, the caretakers/evangelists spend time in the villages visiting with people, telling them about Christ and inviting them to be a part of the new church we will be establishing. Then, during the mission, we hold evangelistic services in an open area in the village. Many come to know the Lord during this time, and these are the people who make up the membership of the new church. Counselors are on hand each night to help them understand what being a follower of Christ means. There is also prayer time for healing and deliverance, and we often have the privilege of praying a blessing over the new churches as well as their new evangelist or caretaker.



EVANGELISM THROUGH COMMUNITY VISITS

We are often fortunate to have time to walk through the villages prior to the evening services and visit with people. They are usually busy doing their daily chores but seem to enjoy talking with us and teaching us about their lives. It gives us a chance to share Christ by showing we are interested in them and by having an opportunity to talk informally with them.






Picture to the left: Washing to represent the Mikvah; Below: Passing through the huppah.

This retreat is wonderful for a small group and is best if it begins on one evening with a Sabbath meal and continues the following day.



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Enhancing Trust



“You did not choose me, but I chose you and appointed you so that you might go and bear fruit—fruit that will last.” John 15:16

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PERCEPTION OF GOD’S LOVE

Beautiful picture, isn’t it? Seems like a place you might want to visit – palm trees swaying, calm ocean waters, and clear, blue sky. It depends on your perspective and your perception.

Perspective sees from *your* point of view, *your* experience and *your* cultural filters and may have little connection to reality. *Perception* sees *reality*, and is formed through knowledge and understanding. If you have visited this castle, you might perceive that this is the Elmina Slave Castle in Ghana, West Africa. You might know that unspeakable atrocities were committed here and in other, similar places.

You might also remember that the smaller building inside the walls was a church, and that those atrocities were committed while European Christians sang their hymns and praised their God. Today, as many as 800,000 human beings are sold into slavery each year. Do we hear their cries any more clearly than our ancestors did? Is our perception of God’s love for them based on a clearer understanding of His truth?

Proverbs 21:13 reads: “Whoever shuts their ears to the cry of the poor will also cry out and not be answered.” We can close our eyes and ears to the truth, but there will be a price to pay. You and I can make a difference, if we just will.

Today, while you’re praising the God who gave His life for you because He loves you so much, ask Him how you can help someone else, someone suffering and poor, to perceive His love through you.
